Dear Chairperson Brownsberger:

Pursuant to FY18 the Department of Correction shall submit biannual reports to the joint committee on the judiciary, the joint committee on public safety and homeland security, and the house and senate committees on ways and means on the use of solitary confinement, also known as segregation, in state prisons; provided further, that 1 of the reports shall cover the period from July 1, 2017 to December 31, 2017, inclusive, and 1 of the reports shall cover the period from January 1, 2018 to June 30, 2018, inclusive; provided further, that such reports shall include, but not be limited to: (i) the number of prisoners subject to solitary confinement; (ii) the length of time spent in solitary confinement; (iii) the number of prisoners with serious mental illness subject to solitary confinement; (iv) the number of prisoners 21 years of age or younger subject to solitary confinement; (v) the number of prisoners subjected to multiple stays in solitary confinement in a given reporting period; (vi) the number of prisoners released directly into the community from solitary confinement or released into the community not more than 30 days after having been in solitary confinement; and (vii) the rate of recidivism for individuals that were subject to solitary confinement. Use of Restrictive Housing¹ Report July 1, 2017 to December 31, 2017 to the Joint Committee on the Judiciary, Public Safety, Homeland Security, and the House and Senate Committees on Ways and Means

From July 1, 2017 to December 31, 2017 a total of 1,929 male inmates were placed in Restrictive Housing. The following data tables demonstrate a description of this cohort.

Ongoing Initiatives:

- > Deputy Commissioner has attended national conferences regarding Restrictive Housing admissions and length of stay in Restrictive Housing.
- Enhancing the Inmate Management System (IMS) to improve data entry and reporting capabilities regarding Restrictive Housing admissions and length of stay.
- Established a monthly triage review process to assess inmates in Restrictive Housing for 45 days or more with the intent of reducing the length of stay in Restrictive Housing.
